Hi Tex,

Please find enclosed an original qsl card from VK3PA dated 27/10/1929.

The card was recently auctioned as part of the late VK3BQ's estate. VK3BQ Max Howden was one of the very first to work Europe and USA as A-3BQ back in 1924/25. Max also ran a piezo crystal manufacturing business for many years.

Percy obtained his licence in 1928. This card is from 1929 and shows that he had already worked quite a number of overseas stations in his first year.

A bit of chronology.

Australian callsigns were originally A-3BQ, etc.

In anticipation of the International Radiotelegraph Conference in Washington 1927, Australian stations added an O to the callsign, so OA-3BQ etc. from 1926.

The result of the Washington Conference had its report ratified on 10 November 1927,

at which time Australia was allocated the callsign block VHA-VMZ.

Therefore it is highly likely that Percy never used the callsign OA-3PA, rather he would have started out with VK3PA and this is his very first qsl card.

You might like to get Ken K16KFB to put a facsimile of the card on the ANZA Net website.

As the apparent current custodian of the ANZA net, I thought it appropriate that you keep this card as a memento.
